Renewing our Vows

Ah... the joys of jam-packed June! A season of celebrations and ceremony moves toward the quiet of summer. Weddings, graduations, moving-up ceremonies, "end of the year" picnics and gatherings - it can be a crazy time of year –and one where soon we give thanks for the gift of summer – and collapse into the quieter months of July and August.

Yet at the heart of many of the ceremonies of this season, some strong promises were made. At any number of weddings, couples looked each other in the eye and made promises to love each other through whatever the days ahead might bring. At confirmation this past month, 23 young people stood before the congregation and promised to seek to be Christ's faithful disciples through all the days before them. As we reach the half-way point of the year, and as we have a moment to pause and reflect, it may be worth asking ourselves the question: how are we doing?

I say that, because it is the very thing I need to hear. After the busy run through late winter and spring, the urge to "take the summer off" from as much as possible is strong. For a time that may be a very good thing. We all need down time – time to rest, time to reflect, time to renew our energies and our focus. It is worth making the commitment to do so, rather than letting our lives simply fill with activity, or drift until fall comes back around. That idea has been reflected in the decision the Session made last month to grant me a summer of sabbatical in 2018 - a

time to refresh and renew and reenergize – with both "down time" and time of very intentional focus and study. I am grateful to the Session's commitment to the health and ongoing growth of the church's pastors!

In the spirit of the commitments made all around us in these recent weeks, it is worth us revisiting our own promises – promises made to spouses and children; promises made to God; promises made to one another. And with that, how might we be intentional during the quieter months ahead of us about living more fully into those promises?

Here at church, take a look through this issue of Grace Notes. Opportunities to grow as a people of faith continue on throughout the summer. It slows a bit – most committees pause for the summer, and the Saturday evening service will take a summer break. But throughout this month and on into summer, there are many ways to renew, refresh, and join the confirmation class in the promise they recently made: *Will you share in the church's worship and ministry, and, through your prayers and gifts, your study and service, fulfill your calling as a disciple of Jesus Christ*?

Together, let us say: We will, with God's help.

Prison Ministry



PRISON MINISTRY OF GRADUATIONS, CELEBRATIONS, AND MOVING ON



June is a time of graduations—when individuals close one chapter of their lives and open a new and unknown one. As we celebrate the graduating seniors of families in RPC, some of the most meaningful graduations take place hidden behind the 40 foot concrete walls of prisons around New York. Through its prison ministry, RPC is proud to help facilitate those graduations.

<u>Hudson Link:</u> On June 7, 33 men at Sing Sing prison will graduate from Hudson Link for Higher Education in Prison, 22 with Associates degrees and 11 with Bachelors. Many of these men are the first in their family to even go to college, let alone graduate. They are setting the bar for their children, encouraging them not to follow dad into prison, but rather to follow him into school.

In addition 24 men will graduate from other Hudson Link programs, which are bringing hope to 6 other prisons in NY. And more will come, demonstrating that this privately funded educational program is clearly scalable. When RPC played a role in launching this program in 1998, with no money and many prayers, little did we know the success it would become and that it would be the model for similar prison education projects in other states.

<u>New York Theological Seminary:</u> On June 14, 13 men will graduate from the NYTS Masters in Professional Studies Program. This is a fully accredited 36 credit graduate program which began in 1982. RPC began meeting monthly with students and graduates of this program in 1995. In our 23rd annual Church and Justice worship service on April 23 12 graduates of this program led all aspects of the service, including our guest preacher.

<u>Rising Hope:</u> On June 15, at least 10 men will graduate from Rising Hope at Sing Sing. This is a program created in 1996 by men in Sing Sing and modeled after the NYTS program. It has expanded to a few other New York prisons and aims to provide the first steps toward college for individuals who may not even have a GED. It has now achieved accreditation, so credits can be transferred to other schools. Our own John Miller teaches in Rising Hope at Sing Sing.

<u>Coming Home:</u> This graduation will take place on June 4 right here in RPC. It is for the 9 individuals who participated in RPC's second Coming Home program—formerly incarcerated individuals build successful lives. The participants, along with members of the congregation, some of whom are mentors for the participants, have met for dinner each week for 18 weeks, exploring ways to find employment, housing, and to tell their own stories and be proud of who they are becoming.

<u>Celebrations:</u> What is a graduation without a celebration?

For *Coming Home* it is a small gathering of participants and mentors, to which anyone in the congregation is also invited, to enable them to give their personal testimony of who they are becoming.

For *Rising Hope* it is often just the feeling of a job well done in taking that first step forward in a prisoner's education. Until now, the Department of Corrections hasn't allowed a celebration for Rising Hope graduations—but that may be starting to change. For *New York Theological Seminary*, it is a luncheon for graduates and their families and friends, to breathe a sigh of relief that their studies are behind them and contemplate how they can best use their education to help others.

For *Hudson Link*, in addition to the graduation and a luncheon in the prison, it is a gala and fundraiser, attended by 300 people at the Grand Hyatt. Most importantly, among the attendees were 25 graduates of Hudson Link (and often NYTS as well), who were able to tell people at their tables how they are using their educations to give back to the society they once harmed by creating or working for non-profits that help steer young people away from crime, develop housing programs for the poor, or helping make positive change in their communities.

All of these graduations celebrate the achievements of men and women who took wrong turns in their lives, paid the price for that, and bent their lives back toward the light of giving to society in positive ways, large and small. RPC is proud to be part of all of these programs and to have played a positive role in the successes these men and women have achieved.

Rye Presbyterian Nursery School

Greetings to the RPC Community from Kristin Bassett Kumar

In all of our four-year-old classrooms we provide the students with an opportunity to learn from "experts" in their field of study. The children ask questions and reflect on the new information they learn. One of our four year old classrooms has been studying astronomy this year. Please enjoy some highlights from this classroom study:

Mrs. Barbero's and Ms. Cunningham's afternoon class showed a great interest in the universe and rocket ships. The class began to research how rockets "blast off," and together they watched a video of a real spaceship launching. They decided to design and create a large rocket ship by using cardboard boxes, recycled materials, and paint.



The rocket ship video that the class watched together referred to the galaxy as a "city of stars." This sparked the children's interest in the stars in the universe. The class learned about our Milky Way which is a galaxy containing

the sun, the solar system, and stars to create light. The formation of the Milky Way led the children to become fascinated with spirals and they wanted to know how a spiral is formed. They formed a large tape spiral on the rug in the block area. They also used a revolving stand and a variety of materials such as shaving cream, paint, and markers to create spirals. As their interest in spirals and stars continued to grow, the students learned about the Aurora Borealis (or Northern Lights), which is an incredible light show caused by collisions between electrically charged particles released from the sun that enter the earth's atmosphere and collide with gases such as oxygen and nitrogen. The lights can be seen around the magnetic poles of the northern and southern hemispheres.



Another question about the universe that the students were interested in was how the different parts of the world are connected to each other. One child's drawing sparked interest in recreating the world on a large piece of paper. The entire class contributed to a large detailed drawing of the land, the sky, and outer space, each created as separate pieces. One student exclaimed, "But, then, is the world separate?" This led the children to question what keeps the world together. They learned about the different layers of the earth and the atmosphere and how gravity plays a role in keeping everything connected.



The class acted out how craters are created on the moon. They made a moon using flour and baby oil. The students decided to use rocks they collected as asteroids and dropped them from up high down on the moon to create holes on the They experimented surface. with whether the heavier rocks formed bigger holes in comparison to the lighter rocks. In April, the class took a field trip together to the Westchester Children's Museum to extend their science adventures. The children explored the principles and concepts of gravity, water molecules, wind, and momentum.
