Grace Notes



Last year we welcomed a cute little two-pound kitten into our home. Iggi has turned into a 13pound cat with quite the personality. One of his peculiar behaviors has to do with his food. He is on free feed so the dry food is always available to him. While his bowl will often have plenty of food in it, if he can see the bottom of the bowl, he's not happy and lets

us know about it. While he has an abundant supply of food, he acts as if there's a scarcity.

As we begin the season of Lent, we are again invited to take the time to reflect upon and examine our lives, our own attitudes toward life, toward others, and toward God. Watching Iggi has me asking, "Do I respond out of abundance or scarcity?" A few weeks ago, at a staff meeting, Rosemary shared a reading out of a devotional book entitled, "Simple Truths." It, too, gets at this question, and possibly our response.

The author wrote: "We build our lives around accumulation — of money, of possessions, of status — as a way of protecting ourselves and our families from the vagaries of the world. Without thinking, we begin to see giving as an economic exchange — a subtracting of something from who and what we are — and we weigh it on the scales of self-interest.

But true giving is not an economic exchange, it is a generative act. It does not subtract from what we have; it multiplies the effect we can have in the world. Many people tend to think of giving only in terms of grand gestures. They miss the simple openings of the heart that can be practiced anywhere with almost anyone.

We can say hello to someone everybody ignores. We can offer to help a neighbor. We can buy a bouquet of flowers and take it to a nursing home, or spend an extra minute talking to someone who needs our time. We can take ten dollars out of our pocket and give it to someone on the street. No praise, no hushed tones of holy generosity. Just give, smile, and walk away.

If you perform these simple acts, little by little you will start to understand the miracle of giving. You will begin to see the unprotected human heart and the honest smiles of human happiness. You will start to feel what is common among us, not what separates and differentiates us. Before long, you will discover that you have the power to create joy and happiness by your simplest gestures of caring and compassion. You will see that you have the power to unlock the goodness in other people's hearts by sharing the goodness in yours.

And, most of all, you will find the other givers. No matter where you live or where you travel, whether you speak their language or know their names, you will know them by their small acts..."

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Our lectionary texts recently have been from Matthew's gospel–The Sermon on the Mount. Jesus said, "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father in heaven." (Matthew 5:14-16)

In the midst of our abundance, will we live like Iggi, becoming anxious when we think we can see the bottom of the bowl? Or this Lenten season will we come to understand that "true giving is not an economic exchange, it is a generative act. It does not subtract from what we have; it multiplies the effect we can have in the world."

Prison Ministry, New Member Orientation



RPC's PRISON MINISTRY Many Paths to Live the Word of Jesus

For over 20 years, Rye Presbyterian Church has been a leader in prison ministry within the Hudson River Presbytery. In

recent years we have expanded the variety of ways to serve those in prison and those who have been released-and we continue to explore fresh ways members of our congregation can get involved in this life-changing and life-affirming work. Here's a summary:

Working with the Incarcerated. Since 1994 we have met monthly with students and graduates of the New York Theological Seminary's Masters Program in Sing Sing. And for 10 years we have held monthly meetings at Fishkill prison outside Beacon with men who are part of an active group of long-term/lifers committed to changing their lives. **Opportunity:** We have openings for additional volunteers at Fishkill, and perhaps Sing Sing, to engage in these dynamic, meaningful discussion groups.

Hearing the Word. On April 23 we will hold our 23rd annual Church and Justice Service, led entirely by men who have graduated from the NYTS program at Sing Sing and have since been released. Opportunity: Come and hear the word of the Lord preached by men who have lived "in the belly of the beast." The service is followed by a luncheon in which graduates describe the positive things they are doing with their freedom.

Helping the Formerly Incarcerated. In February we launched the 2nd year of Coming Home, a weekly program that provides fellowship, community, direction, and mentoring to men and women who have recently come home from prison. A communal dinner is shared from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. each Thursday. Opportunity: Join us for dinner any Thursday and get to know these men and women who are creating new lives for themselves. Or you and some friends could partner to prepare and serve one of the meals.

Other ways RPC is Involved. The above are the most visible elements of our church's engagement with prison and the criminal justice system generally. There are others:

- Rising Hope. Twenty years ago, we helped inmates create and implement this program, modeled after the NYTS Masters program, for inmates with a GED or maybe a little more. Dr. Miller has taught in this program for three years, bringing hope and learning to men who are seeking to learn and grow.
- Hudson Link. After support for college programs was withdrawn by the State in the late 1990s, we helped inmates develop Hudson Link, a privately-funded degree granting college program now working in seven prisons around the state. Hudson Link has become a nationally recognized leader in prison education.
- Presbytery Prison Partnership. Through Presbytery, we joined with a few other churches to spread the word of the importance of prison ministry among all churches in the Hudson River Presbytery. This partnership has led to several creative ways to connect with and provide support to men and women in prison.

Future Opportunities. As more people within our congregation experience the blessing and satisfaction that comes with working with men and women inside the walls and beyond, new ideas surface for ways to expand our programs in ways that are simple, not time-consuming, and profoundly meaningful, both to those in prison and those outside who volunteer. Here are some of the ideas the church is exploring through the Mission Study. All of these are in use in one or more churches within our Presbytery, so there are models to follow.

- Letter Writing. Some men and women in prison never get any mail. Through the chaplains in each prison, we could identify those who are working to change their lives and providing positive influences to those around them. Only first names are used and the return address is RPC.
- Sending Calendars. People in prison apparently love to have calendars. The church could select one or more smaller prisons, often way upstate, and send a calendar to everyone incarcerated there.
- Visiting the Incarcerated. This is obviously a much more personal connection. But, again, chaplains could identify individuals in prison (Bedford for women and Sing Sing for men are the most proximate) who would be appropriate to be contacted in this way. Bedford Presbyterian Church has been doing this kind of program for three years and finds it profoundly meaningful.

RPC is extremely proud of its leadership in prison ministry and related criminal justice matters. We are eager to enable more in the congregation to become involved in ways that fit their needs and time availabilities and will continue to explore new avenues to expand our church's involvement.

How to Relate to Those Who Are Suffering

There is a proverb which describes an all-too-human problem each of us faces from time to time. "Like one who takes away a garment on a cold day, or like vinegar poured on soda, is one who sings songs to a heavy heart." (Proverbs 25:20) We want to reach out and help those who are hurting—but the words or actions we use may unintentionally add to their burdens instead of easing their pain. Sometimes we need a reminder about what to say or do—and what *not* to say or do when providing care.

Forged in the crucible of his own experiences of suffering, Stephen Ministries founder Kenneth C. Haugk shaped a book through research with over four thousand individuals who had also experienced suffering in their lives. Dr. Haugk listened to their stories and compressed their collective wisdom into gems of compassion and understanding that everyone can learn from and use. If you find it challenging to relate to a suffering friend or family member, *Don't Sing Songs to a Heavy Heart* provides a much-needed guide for giving people comfort in their times of need. One reviewer described the book, "No fluff – just compelling reading on the art of intelligent sensitivity toward those who are suffering." Stephen Ministries and RPC provides many resources to encourage and equip Caregivers.

What was spiritual formation like during the time of Jesus? The Peter B. Knock Internship in Sacred Music at RPC

In May 2016, the Trustees of the Peter B. Knock Fund developed and presented to the Worship and Music Committee and to the

with organists Caroline Robinson and David von Behren, the 2016 Knock Award recipients.

Donations received will support a new initiative: The Knock Internship in Sacred Music at Rye Presbyterian Church.

Session a plan to redirect the major part of the existing balance in the Knock Fund from awards to college, seminary, and university students for the study of sacred music to having an intern in sacred music on-site here at RPC (now limited geographically, as the intern would need to be enrolled at a college, seminary, or university within a reasonable driving or train-ride distance from Rye). Supplemental funding from the Imagine Initiative was approved to make feasible two years of internship (ideally one intern tumn.

The goal of the internship is to provide a hands-on educational experience that includes regular playing and conducting opportunities within the context of worship and rehearsals. Worship and rehearsal planning, through working with the pastors and me, also will be a part of the duties. The internship is structured to have a time commitment of an average of 8-10 hours per week, for approximately 28 weeks, running October through Christmas Eve and February through mid- to late-May. Participation in services on Christmas Eve, Maundy Thursday, and Easter will be required.

Please keep this new ministry in your prayers. May we all and the ones yet to be chosen to be the interns the next two program years grow in spirit and wisdom!

markers and colored pencils for sketching, watercolor palettes, and small animals and insects for little fingers.
