- Presbyterianism in the US throughout the 1800's was characterized by widening regional differences, splits and factions - and growing disagreements and divisions over theology, governance, and reform – especially concerning the position on slavery.
- After the Civil War, the Presbyterian Church of the United States emerged as the largest body, one that would later merge with several other splintered factions to form the Presbyterian Church (USA) in 1983, again the leading organization. This is the organization with which RPC is associated.
- Throughout all this, and despite a pervasive cultural view at the time that women belonged in the home, Presbyterian women were at the forefront of national and societal movements – strong supporters of mission work and advocates for the underprivileged, underserved and underrepresented.

- In the 1900's, the Presbyterian Church as a whole experienced the simultaneous and oppositional rise of fundamentalist and modernist Christianity – brought to a head over issues such as the 60's Civil Rights Movement, the ordination of women, and since the 90's the ordination of gays and lesbians.
- The Women's Association continued its tradition of supporting foreign and home missions. The women's fundraising guilds and circles had a tremendous international perspective – learning about and reaching out to missions all over the world, including Siam (yes, Siam – Thailand's name until the late 40's), Laos, Japan, Africa.
- The women of our church stepped up during many times of crisis, especially to provide clothing and food packages, as well as first aid supplies, particularly during the Great Depression years, two World Wars, and the Korean and Viet Nam wars.
- They grappled with how to reconcile Christian beliefs with concerns over a new atomic age, a nuclear arms race, changing attitudes towards women staying at home versus entering the work force, race relations, and more. The more things change, the more they stay the same, but RPC women also strive to make a visible difference in the world.
